He has a section of the wellbeing noticeboard at St. Mary's dedicated to "SSS" – Simonds Safety Strategies where he brings items of a safety interest into focus. Below, is the current safety message. 
- Everyone has the right to be safe and to be protected from abuse.
- No-one should behave in a way that makes you feel unsafe or afraid, including anyone in your family, anyone at school or anywhere else in the community.
- Tell a teacher or an adult at your school if you feel unsafe.
- It's everyone's responsibility.
- Adults at school must listen and respond to concerns about child abuse.
- If you suspect abuse of any child or young person, you have a responsibility to report it, even if you are not sure.

Sexting

Sending or being in possession of indecent images or video of people under-18 is against the law.





- If you are under 18 and you receive a sext of a person under 18, you are in possession of child pornography.
- It is illegal to possess child pornography and you can be charged even as a minor.
- It is illegal to forward to other people, sexts of people under the age of 18.
- Be safe and sensible. Protect your name and your reputation never send or ask to be sent, sexts!
- If you receive a sext, screen shot the sender and date/time & report to an adult immediately.

National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN)

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) 2019 for Years 7 and 9 students will be held next week. The testing timetable is as follows:

Tuesday 14 May	Language Conventions Writing
Wednesday 15 May	Reading
Thursday 16 May	Numeracy

Tests will take place before lunchtime and regular classes will run at other times.

Please ensure your son has the required material for each test:

- All tests 2B or HB pencils, eraser, sharpener
- Writing Test a black or blue pen may be used instead of a pencil
- Numeracy Test calculator.

The results of the tests provide information for students, parents and the school which can be used to improve student achievement. All students are expected to participate in the NAPLAN tests.

Later in the year you will receive your son's personal NAPLAN report. The report will describe your son's particular skills in each of the key areas. The report will also show how your child performed in relation to national minimum standards. These describe the minimum acceptable standards for students across Australia. Students are advised that they should be undertaking regular, ongoing review and consolidation of their learning. Year 7 and 8 students will sit for exams only in English and Maths as a means of giving them a more gradual introduction to the experience. Year 10 students studying a VCE subject will have exams for this unit in line with the Year 11s.

To support Year 7-10 students as they prepare for examinations, a Study Guide will be made available later this term. This will include a complete examination schedule.

Friday 14 June is a Correction and Report Writing day for teachers. There are **no classes** and students will only be required at school if they have unfinished assessments.

2019 MATHEMATICS CHALLENGE FOR YOUNG AUSTRALIANS



On Monday 13 of May, fifteen students will commence the Mathematics **AUSTRALIAN MATHS TRUST** Challenge. This competition is a problem-solving activity that aims to stimulate and challenge students who enjoy mathematics.

Students receive a problem book containing six questions and are required to present written solutions to as many of these problems as they can. The problems are challenging and require time and persistence, but are based on maths that should be known to them. Students may work with a partner who has also entered the Challenge, but will need to submit their own separate solutions. When attempting the problems students may use resources such as textbooks, calculators or websites that provide general maths information, but are not to seek help from other people, including asking for assistance on maths help websites.

To encourage students to work on their challenge problems, help sessions will be held in the library at lunch time. These sessions will give students the opportunity to work with others and to check solution processes with Ms Sinis. All participating students are encouraged to work on their challenge as part of their daily homework and would benefit from attending the lunch time sessions.

Dear parents, guardians and carers

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information.
