Probably the most important thing I would say to you, is that if you are unsure about something, make sure you ask someone who can assist you.



OUR READING PROGRAM

REP stands for "Reading Equals Power"- It's an appropriate title given the link between wider reading and educational outcomes. REP involves four 30 minute sessions per week, where students read novels of their choice.




To ensure the novels chosen are not too hard and not too easy, students read books from within their "reading range", which is derived from their reading comprehension results. When students finish a novel, they complete an online comprehension quiz. The results of completed quizzes are fed back to teachers, parents and the student. This system allows students to read appropriately levelled material of their choice, whilst allowing teachers to track their students' progress and provide extra support where necessary.

At the end of each semester, our students' achievements in REP are celebrated through the presentation of awards for "most improved", "most books read" and "most quiz points scored". There is also healthy competition between homegroups to see who can score the most points. Research on the importance of wider reading is very clear – it develops crucial cognitive skills, expands vocabulary and develops general knowledge. It really does give students power in the classroom and power in life. As such, it is the expectation that all Simonds students will read not only during REP, but also at home for 30 minutes per day. We ask that parents commit to ensuring this happens.

Learning Diversity Our teachers recognise the wide spectrum of learning profiles within each class. Students with diverse learning needs are supported in the classroom by Learning Support Officers and through Individual Learning Plans that include customised learning goals and modified curriculum and assessments. For further information, please contact the Learning Diversity Coordinator.

SPARK stands for "Simonds Program for Accelerated Reading and Knowledge". As it sounds, SPARK is a separate subject with a focus on developing the reading skills of students who need extra support in this area. SPARK classes consist of no more than eight students and they operate in place of languages.




Students should be at school by 8.30am in order to have enough time to get books and materials from their locker.

Purchasing the School Uniform

POLDING

John Bede Polding arrived in Australia on 13 September 1835. He was appointed Vicar Apostolic with jurisdiction over what is now the Commonwealth of Australia.



MANNIX

Archbishop Daniel Mannix was the Archbishop of Melbourne for 45 years and made his name with the Conscription issue during World War One. Twice he confronted the Prime Minister, William Hughes, on this matter, and with the help of the troops on the Western Front in Europe, defeated the Conscription Bill.



KNOX

Robert James Knox was appointed as the Archbishop of Melbourne, serving between 1967 and 1974. He saw education as pivotal and proposed one central theological college, rather than separate seminaries for diocesan priests and those of religious institutes.



GOOLD

Bishop James Goold helped to restore order and calm on the gold fields of Victoria and saw the need for school buildings within the Melbourne Area.

Established in 1996, Simonds Catholic College is the result of an amalgamation of West Melbourne's St Mary's Boys' Regional School and East Melbourne's Cathedral College.

Each of the schools has a history spanning back more than one hundred years. Today, we exist to provide an excellent Catholic education for boys in the inner-city area of Melbourne.

A second campus, located in Fitzroy North, was opened in 2010 to cater for Years 11 & 12 and in 2019

Year 10s joined them. Following our acquisition of a multi storey building that backs on to our existing space in the heart of the city, and the completion of refurbishment, all year levels at our West Melbournes site. Our great dream of being together on one campus will become a reality in 2023.

We are honoured to be the first school to be named after **Justin Simonds**, Archbishop of Melbourne 1963–67, Parish Priest of West Melbourne for 21 years, and the first Australian born Archbishop. His Australian heritage is most appropriate for our school, which aims to bring together boys from many different backgrounds and educate them towards maturity as responsible adults who are proud to be Australian. Justin Simonds was also a distinguished scholar and although he was only Archbishop of Melbourne for a few years, he made a substantial contribution to Catholic education at a time of great expansion in the number of Catholic secondary schools in the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

Simonds Catholic College draws on the traditions of two excellent schools:

St Mary's Boys' Regional School began in 1855 as a primary school for boys. The school was located in the old St Mary's Church. During the week a curtain was drawn across the middle of the church. On one side of the curtain was St Mary's Girls' School and on the other St Mary's Boys' School. All the teachers at the boys' school were lay teachers. In 1902 the Christian Brothers were invited to administer the school which they did until 1985. A new school facing onto Howard Street was built in 1910. This school was further extended in 1970 and 1976 with additional buildings, and the school gradually changed from providing primary education to catering for boys in Years 7-10.

Cathedral College was so named because of its association with St Patrick's Cathedral, it has both an old and unique history. Originally the college was the foundation college of the Christian Brothers in Australia and was opened in 1871. At the end of 1967, CBC Victoria Parade, known simply as Parade, moved to Bundoora. During that year the Archdiocese bought the site from the Christian Brothers following the decision to establish Cathedral College as a diocesan school. Cathedral College was administered by the Christian Brothers until it closed in 1995.

A wide variety of structures and processes have been established to promote a sense of belonging and wellbeing amongst the boys, especially those who are new to the College.



PASTORAL CARE TEACHERS All students are allocated to a Pastoral Care class; Year 7-9 students will have a teacher who normally takes them for several different subjects. The Pastoral Care Teacher is responsible for the wellbeing of each student in their Homeroom.

STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL Boys nominate themselves to be elected to the Student Representative Council by their peers. In Year 12, Student Leaders are chosen from the whole student group. The SRC organise many different activities across all year levels, including fundraising for social justice.

PASTORAL CARE PROGRAM All students have Pastoral Classes each week. Through these classes we strive to support each student's social and emotional learning and promote the wellbeing of all students.

What to do if ...

... I have a problem? In the first instance you should see your Homeroom Teacher or your Year Level Coordinator.

... I want to call my parents? Students are not permitted to use their mobile phone at any time. If you need to contact your parents, please go to the Office and ask the Receptionist to call your parents. Phones must be turned off and stored in your locker for the duration of the school day.

... I don't wear my uniform?

You must have a note explaining why you are not in uniform and obtain a Uniform pass from your Year Level Coordinator before school begins.

... I feel sick at school?


Tell one of the teachers and they will arrange for you to visit the school office, **you must not use your phone.** You may be able to rest in the sick bay and if required, your parents will be called to take you home.

... I am absent from school?

Your parent or guardian must telephone the office to notify the school of your absence before 9.00am, the school office number is 9321 9200 or office@sccmelb.catholic.edu.au.

When you return to school you must also bring a note explaining your absence, signed by your parent or guardian. If planning an absence of more than one day for any reason (such as a holiday or hospital visit), a note to the Year Level Coordinator, the school office, or Homeroom Teacher is required prior to the absence.

- ... I am late to school? If you arrive late you must sign in on the iPad at Reception and take a late slip to hand to your class teacher. Parents must ring the school office if their son is delayed due to appointments. Note: After School Detention is given to students who arrive late without a valid reason.
- ... I need to leave during school hours? You must bring a note from your parent/guardian and hand it to your Homeroom Teacher in the morning. This must be signed by the Homeroom teacher or Year Level Coordinator before you leave. When you are ready to leave you must go to the office, hand your note to the Receptionist and sign out. If you are returning later in the day, you must report to the school office and sign back in. You are not permitted to leave the school grounds during recess or lunch.
- ... I need to know when and where my classes are? iSimonds is our Learning Management System and will guide you through your day. It lists your classes and classrooms, displays messages for the day and links to your subject information, including due dates of tasks. Most of your classes will be in Building A (in the same building as the office).



FREQUENTLY ASKED

QUESTIONS ...

How much homework will there be?

On average there will be one hour of homework per night. During Term 1 this amount should be less in order to help students transition into secondary school. We expect students to try their best. If they have difficulties with homework they should speak to their subject teacher the next morning and ask for assistance or for an extension.

When do I wear my sports uniform?

Students are to wear their sports uniform to school only when they have a double period of Health & Physical Education. Students can also wear their sports uniform on designated sport days, or days when they are participating in an ACC sport.

Will it be difficult to make friends?

Students starting Year 7 at Simonds Catholic College come from over 35 different primary schools, so many of you will be in the same situation and may not know anyone else. As you begin to transition into our school, starting with the Orientation Day, there will be plenty of activities that will allow you to get to know other students, and hopefully make some life long friends along the way. Once you start at school next year, you will be grouped into a Pastoral Care class and you will study your subjects with the same group of students. The Year 7 camp is also held early in Term 1 and you will participate in many team building exercises to build on the friendships you have started making. If you experience any difficulties making friends, you are welcome to speak to your Pastoral Care teacher or our School Counsellor, Ms Dunell, who may be able to offer some advice.

Is it difficult to catch public transport to school?

Most of our students use public transport everyday. To plan a journey from your home, we recommend you visit the Journey Planner available on the Public Transport Victoria website at www.ptv.vic.gov.au/journey. There is a map and some common transport options listed in this booklet. We ask that you look neat and tidy and behave in a respectful and polite manner when using public transport or walking to and from school. Remember to give up your seat for the pregnant, elderly or disabled. Please be mindful and courteous of others around you when travelling by not yelling, speaking or playing music or games loudly, and turn your phones to vibrate.




